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1. Foreword

I have great pleasure in introducing the annual report of the Aberdeen City and Shire Strategic Development Planning Authority (SDPA) covering 2010/11.

This has been a good year for the SDPA, one of transition where work has continued on the implementation of the structure plan but with preparatory work for the first strategic development plan also taking place.

The year has seen both successes and frustrations as we seek to deliver on our shared vision for the future. Successes have been achieved as a number of projects of regional significance have moved through their respective consenting processes and good progress has been made with the local development plans being prepared by the two councils. A number of developments in the area have also received national recognition which is always particularly welcome. However, frustrations have focused on the delivery of the Aberdeen Western Peripheral Route and associated infrastructure which has been held up by legal challenges in the courts.

I trust that 2011/12 will be a year when we can make even more progress to achieve our shared aspirations for the future ... "an excellent place to live, visit and do business".

I trust that you find this report of interest and commend it to you.



2. Introduction

This is the third annual report of the Aberdeen City and Shire Strategic Development Planning Authority (SDPA). This report covers the period 1 April 2010 to 31 March 2011. The SDPA's accounts for 2010/11 will be published separately and made available on the SDPA's website later in the year.

This annual report provides the opportunity to both review the achievements of the past year and look forward to the year ahead, following a similar structure to previous reports.

Section 3 provides a background to and governance of the SDPA, while section 4 covers the SDP Team. Section 5 provides a review of the year, with a look forward to the year ahead contained in section 8. The funding and expenditure of the SDPA are addressed in section 6, with the monitoring framework contained in section 7.



3. Governance of the SDPA

Background

Since the abolition of Regional Councils in 1996, planning authorities in Scotland were required (either individually or jointly) to prepare structure plans – documents which set out a strategic framework for the use of land in an area. In the case of North East Scotland, Aberdeen City and Aberdeenshire Councils were required to jointly prepare a plan.

The Scottish Executive announced its intention to conduct a review of arrangements for strategic planning in November 2000. Following a series of consultations on the reform of the planning system in general and arrangements for strategic planning in particular, the Planning etc. (Scotland) Act 2006 gave Scottish Ministers the power to create Strategic Development Planning Authorities (SDPAs). On 25 June 2008, four designation orders came into force, one of which (No. 2) covered Aberdeen City and Aberdeenshire.

The principal purpose for the establishment of SDPAs was to provide a vital forum for planning authorities to jointly establish a common approach to matters that extend beyond an individual authority's boundaries. In particular, the 2006 Act places a duty on SDPAs to prepare and keep under review a strategic development plan (SDP).

Governance

Scottish Government Circular 2/2008 (April 2008) sets out the Scottish Government's statutory guidance on SDPAs. Among other things it identified the need to establish a joint committee of members and a dedicated team of officers.

A minute of agreement between Aberdeen City and Aberdeenshire Councils and a set of standing orders currently govern the operation of the SDPA. These documents were agreed by Aberdeen City Council and Aberdeenshire Council in 2008, being amended in 2010. Appendix 1 sets out the aims and objectives of the SDPA.

The Aberdeen City and Shire SDPA consists of 12 members, with six being appointed by each council. This is in line with Circular 2/2008 and its recognition of the need for flexibility in the number of members from each planning authority. The Chair and Vice-Chair are from different Councils and they hold office for a period of two years. At the end of the Chair's term of office the Vice-Chair will automatically assume the role of Chair and a new Vice-Chair will be elected.

Meetings of the SDPA take place in public at least four times a year and more regularly when required. Meetings are held on an alternating basis at the Town House (Aberdeen City) and Woodhill House (Aberdeenshire) in Aberdeen and the administration and responsibility for clerking the meetings rotates accordingly.

Four meetings of the SDPA took place during the year as follows:

- 25 March 2011

Membership

The membership of the SDPA did not change during 2010/11. Membership at the end of the year is set out in figure 1 below.

4. Strategic Development Plan Team

The Strategic Development Plan Manager reports to the Head of Planning and Sustainable Development (Aberdeen City Council) and the Head of Planning and Building Standards (Aberdeenshire Council). Together they form the Strategic Development Plan Management Group who meet on a regular basis to prepare and monitor work programmes as well as consider appropriate consultations and reports to be presented to the SDPA.

The Strategic Development Plan Team itself went through a period of transition during the year. Laura Robertson (Senior Planner) had been on secondment with Aberdeen City Council since




Figure 5: Strategic Development Plan Team

September 2009 and moved permanently in May 2010. Dalia Taeima (July 2010) and Peter Shannon (August 2010) both moved on for family reasons during the year and Alanna Lyle took up a 12 month secondment with Aberdeenshire Council in September 2010. These changes are highlighted in figures 4 and 5 below.

Due to tight financial settlements being experienced by the two councils it was not possible to replace the members of staff who left. However, both councils did provide some additional staff resource to keep the work of the SDPA moving forward.

Figure 4: Staff complement in Strategic Development Plan Team (2010/11)

5. Review of the Year

Although primarily established to prepare and keep under review a strategic development plan for the area, the SDPA was initially tasked with continuing work on a structure plan which had formally begun in February 2007.

A: Aberdeen City and Shire Structure Plan

The Aberdeen City and Shire Structure Plan was approved by Scottish Minister on 14 August 2009. An Action Programme was published in December 2009 and a Baseline Monitoring Report in March 2010. Actions in 2010/11 focused on the implementation of the plan through the Action Programme.

Update and exceptions reports for the Action Programme were considered by the SDPA in June and December 2010 with progress monitored against the 60 identified actions.

Progress was made against many of the actions during the year, although a number were more challenging, particularly those related to the delivery of critical transport infrastructure including the Aberdeen Western Peripheral Route. The preparation of supplementary guidance for strategic waste management infrastructure was also delayed by the publication of Annex B to the Zero Waste Plan by the Scottish Government in February 2011.

B: Development Plan Scheme

The publication of a development plan scheme is a statutory requirement placed on the SDPA by the Planning etc. (Scotland) Act 2006.



The development plan scheme sets out the authority's programme for preparing and reviewing its strategic development plan and what is likely to be involved at each stage. It also includes a participation statement, stating when, how and with whom consultation on the plan will take place, as well as the authority's proposals for public involvement in the plan preparation process. The scheme must be regularly monitored and reviewed at least annually.

The SDPA's third statutory development plan scheme was agreed by the SDPA on 25 March 2011 and subsequently submitted to Scottish Ministers and published both electronically and in hard-copy.

The development plan scheme continues to have a 'Crystal Mark' from the Plain English Campaign, a recognition of the efforts made to present information in a clear way for all members of the community.

C: Strategic Development Plan

Work on the strategic development plan started during 2010/11. Much of this work was preparatory in nature and focused on the preparation of background studies and reports as well as the initial steps in identifying potential issues and options for discussion in the Main Issues Report.




An update to the Housing Need and Demand Assessment has been prepared and was submitted to the Scottish Government's Centre for Housing Market Assessment for appraisal in March 2011. This builds upon the Assessment prepared in support of the two Local Development Plans which was assessed as 'robust and credible' in June 2010. By March 2011 a monitoring statement and climate change study were also well advanced, with other supporting documents also under preparation.

A number of meetings took place throughout the year with key stakeholders and agencies to inform the content of the Main Issues Report.

Papers were presented to both Community Planning Partnerships during the year to keep them informed of progress with the preparation of the strategic development plan and the processes involved. Both have requested updates in 2011/12 as consultation is carried out.

D: Supplementary Planning Guidance

Although work on supplementary planning guidance for strategic waste management infrastructure was delayed as clarity from the Scottish Government was awaited in the form of Annex B to the Zero Waste Plan, work progressed well to facilitate developer contributions for strategic transport interventions. This has been taken forward with Nestrans, Transport Scotland and the two councils following a transport modeling exercise carried out jointly during the year. It is anticipated consultation on these will take place in late 2011 in parallel with the main issues report.



E: SDPA website

The ethos behind the website design was to make the site as informative, accessible and interactive as possible, while keeping the site simple. In concordance with the ethos, the site is regularly updated (including 8 news items during 2010/11) to make it an invaluable communication tool with stakeholders and the public which reflects e-government aspirations and increasing user expectations. The SDP Team maintains ownership and editing rights for the site.

The website continues to be an invaluable means of communication with the public and stakeholders. Since the introduction of new website monitoring software at the start of October 2009, data has been included in the SDPA Bulletin on a 6 monthly basis. During 2010/11 the site has attracted over 3,700 unique visitors and a total of 25,600 page views.

The number of people registered on the website stood at 146 in March 2011. Registered users received 4 e-updates during the year.

F: Raising our profile

The activities to raise the profile of the SDPA during the year have been many and varied, including speaking to stakeholder groups on a range of strategic planning issues. Some of these are outlined below.

The SDP Manager spoke at a conference of Irish planners in Athlone, County Westmeath in March 2011, providing a perspective on the development of 'core strategies' from a Scottish perspective. The event was organised by the National Institute for Regional and Spatial Analysis (National University of Ireland, Maynooth) and was attended by around 120 people from most of the planning authorities across the Republic of Ireland. A presentation was also given to the North Sea Network of Regional Development Planners in September 2010, an event hosted by Aberdeenshire Council at Delgatie Castle, Turriff.


The SDPA were shortlisted, alongside Nestrans, ACSEF and the two partner councils for the 'Best Transport Integration' category in the Scottish Transport Awards 2010 and the SDP Team were recognised by Aberdeen City Council at their 'Recognising Achievement Awards' in September 2010.

The SDPA made one press release during 2010/11 on the subject of the delay caused by the Court of Session action relating to the Aberdeen Western Peripheral Route (AWPR). This item received wide coverage on the TV, radio, newspapers and internet.

The SDPA have been part of two Scottish Government groups during 2010/11, both of which are running into 2011/12. The first of these is the Quantitative Greenhouse Gas Assessment Steering Group, set up to inform Scottish Government research aimed at assessing the scope for a tool to assess the greenhouse gas impacts of spatial planning policy. A 'Stage 1' report was published in February 2010 and the project has now moved into Stage 2 with the aim of building the tool. The group met on three occasions during 2010/11, on two occasions SDPA participation was via teleconference. The second group is the Carbon Capture and Storage Programme Monitoring Board, set up to raise awareness, identify and resolve issues and assist the progression of timely consenting decisions for the Longannet Carbon Capture and Storage (CCS) project. This Board met on two occasions during 2010/11.

The SDPA team met with all neighbouring planning authorities (Moray Council, Angus Council, Cairngorms National Park Authority and TAYplan SDPA) during the year and the SDPA was represented by the chair at the Convenors of Planning meeting in Stirling in November 2010.

The team contributed to the publication of an innovative graphic leaflet called "The Big Picture". This will be used by all four SDPAs in engagement on their strategic development plans. It is proposed to turn this into a 3 minute animation on the internet by Summer 2011 to make it even



more accessible – helping communities engage with strategic planning issues. The SDPA has also been working alongside Nestrans and ACSEF in the preparation of an interactive brochure and website to, among other things, highlight the joined-up nature of economic, transport and land-use strategies at the city region scale.

The SDPA gave evidence during the year to the Aberdeenshire Council Scrutiny and Audit Committee investigation into waste management and, in partnership with Nestrans, the Scottish Parliament's investigation into the relationship between land use and transport planning.

A good practice case study was published on the Scottish Government website which focused on the preparation of the Aberdeen City and Shire Structure Plan.

G: Consultation responses

Formal responses were made to eight consultations during the year, including five to the Scottish Government (in relation to Marine Region Boundaries, Land Use Strategy, Sustainability Labeling within Building Standards, Amendments to the Modernised Planning System and the Digital Ambition for Scotland), one to Transport Scotland (Development Planning and Management Transport Appraisal Guidance), one to another SDPA (TAYplan Main Issues Report) and one to Scottish and Southern Energy (Transmission Price Control).

Considerable engagement also took place throughout the year with both councils on their local development plan Main Issues Reports and Proposed Plans.

H: Travel to work

During the year, members of the SDPA Team travelled to work by car, bus, bicycle and on foot. While most trips were on foot, the greatest environmental impact came from the car journeys. Only one member of staff regularly drove to work during the year but during the summer months started cycling to work. Cycling represented a saving of 400 miles of car journeys through the year or a reduction of 94Kg in CO₂ emissions. During National Bike Week (June 2010) the member of staff won the Aberdeen Cycle Forum / Getabout 'Commuter Challenge'.


Travel on business is recorded as a performance measure and the results for 2010/11 can be found in Appendix 2.

6. Funding and Expenditure

Aberdeen City and Aberdeenshire Councils jointly fund the SDPA on a 50:50 basis. In 2010/11, this amounted to a total contribution of £177,000, with £88,000 coming from each Council.

The SDPA's accounts are audited by Audit Scotland on an annual basis. Draft accounts for 2010/11 have been submitted and it is anticipated that these will be approved and published on the SDPA website later in 2011. However, figure 6 shows a provisional breakdown of costs for 2010/11.

7. Monitoring Framework and Performance Indicators

It is important that monitoring takes place in relation to outcomes, outputs and impacts. In light of this, there are three elements to the SDPA's monitoring activity.

The structure plan

The structure plan established a monitoring framework against which the performance of the plan can be measured. A baseline monitoring report was prepared in early 2010 and will form the benchmark for future monitoring activity. This work will be supplemented by a Monitoring Statement required by the Planning etc. (Scotland) Act 2006 – the monitoring statement must be published alongside the main issues report which is due in September 2011.

The action programme and development plan scheme

The structure plan action programme was agreed by the SDPA in December 2009. It was agreed that the action programme, as well as the SDPA actions arising from National Planning Framework 2 would be monitored every six months and reported to the June (exception report) and December (full update) meetings of the SDPA. Monitoring will also take place against the development plan scheme in terms of progress with the strategic development plan.

Performance indicators

A set of performance indicators were established and agreed by the SDPA during 2009/10 and are presented in Appendix 2. These focus on the outputs of the SDPA and also cover its performance against commitments to transparency, accountability, Plain English, equalities and human rights and environmental responsibility found in the development plan scheme.

The indicators provide a baseline against which future performance can be monitored as well as providing an opportunity to compare performance with the other three SDPAs.

8. The Year Ahead

The focus of work during 2011/12 will be the implementation of the structure plan and its review as work progresses with the preparation of a strategic development plan.

Strategic Development Plan

The primary focus of the work of the SDPA during 2011/12 will be the preparation of, and consultation on, a Main Issues Report to be published in September 2011

This will involve a number of meetings with Key Agencies (Nestrans, NHS Grampian, Scottish Enterprise, Scottish Environment Protection Agency, Scottish Natural Heritage, Scottish Water, Health and Safety Executive, Historic Scotland and Transport Scotland) as well as a range of other stakeholders. Active engagement will be sought throughout the process, including to the various studies and assessments required as part of the process.

Wide consultation and engagement with groups, communities and individuals will be the focus between September and December 2011 followed by an analysis of the results of this during early 2012.

An early priority will be seeing the Housing Need and Demand Assessment assessed as 'robust and credible'. This needs to happen in advance of the publication of the Main Issues Report in September 2011 but it is anticipated that only limited additional work will be required following the document's submission in March 2011.

Structure Plan Action Programme

The SDPA will continue to work with partners to deliver the policies and proposals set out in the structure plan, monitoring progress on these every six months. The Action Programme will be re-published in December 2011, two years after its initial publication.

Supplementary Planning Guidance

Supplementary planning guidance will be progressed during the year covering strategic waste management infrastructure and developer contributions for strategic transport interventions.

SDPA Liaison

The Strategic Development Plan Managers for the four SDPAs (along with the Scottish Government) will continue to meet on a quarterly basis. One joint project for 2011/12 will be an online version

of the "Bigger Picture" leaflet in collaboration with Architecture and Design Scotland.

Communications Strategy

Work on joining up the communications strategies for the SDPA with Nestrans and ACSEF commenced in 2009/10 and will be completed in 2011/12 to complement the various consultations going on throughout the year.

Meetings of the SDPA

Four meetings of the SDPA have been agreed for 2011/12. However, additional meetings can be inserted if necessary. At the current time, issues around the preparation of the main issues report for the strategic development plan are those most likely to trigger the need for additional meetings.

Appendix 1: Aims and Objectives of the SDPA

1. To prepare a “strategic development plan” for an area known as a “strategic development plan area” and to keep under review the plan so prepared.
2. Prepare and keep under review a plan, for submission to Scottish Ministers, showing the boundary which the authority propose as the boundary of the strategic development plan area.
3. Set out in the strategic development plan a vision statement, a spatial strategy, and an analysis of the relationship between the vision statement, the spatial strategy and general development land use proposals in the plan area.
4. To monitor changes in the principal physical, economic, social, and environmental characteristics of the strategic development plan area.
5. To monitor the principal purposes for which land is to be used in the area.
6. To monitor the size and distribution of the population of the area.
7. To monitor the infrastructure of the area (including communications, transport and drainage systems and systems for the supply of water and energy) and to monitor how that infrastructure is used.
8. To monitor the impact of the policies and proposals contained within the strategic development plan.
9. To comment on nationally and regionally significantly planning applications.
10. To provide appropriate input to the Regional Transport Strategy, the Aberdeen City and Shire Economic Future strategies, the Local Development Plans and any other significant issues which may arise from time to time and have a bearing on the Strategic Development Plan.
11. To prepare an implementation programme for action.
12. Prepare such maps, diagrams, illustrations and descriptive matter as may be prescribed by Government or thought appropriate by the SDPA.
13. From time to time, and when main issues and other principal reports are prepared, publish a statement as to the carrying out of those documents and make such documents available by various means including electronic means such as by means of the internet.
14. Other matters as may be prescribed by Government
15. Any other matter which the SDPA consider it appropriate to include.
